Annexure 1

FEEDBACK

The institution has a well-structured feedback mechanism to perceive performance and quality. It has a customized and computer based performance appraisal system to collect feedback on principal from teachers (PAPT), Head of the Department from the teaching staff of the concerned Department (PAHT) and an extensive feedback mechanism of the performance of the teachers by students (PATS). Under PATS, for each teacher, around 40-50 students are taken randomly from the classes where the teacher engages lectures and a pre-designed questionnaire is supplied to students. They give their feedback online, which are analyzed by specially designed indigenous software and the report is given to the teachers, with ranking in the College. Student satisfaction index (SSI) is also calculated to get a quantitative assessment from the student on the services provided by the Institution.

Best Practice Annexure 3

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional objectives and/or contributed to the quality improvement of the core activities of the College.

Best Practices

1. Gunvati John Kapoor's 'Youth Leaders as Changemakers Fellowship' (YLCM):

The programme is a collaborative of Guru Nanak Khalsa College, Gunvati J. Kapoor Medical Charitable Trust and PUKAR and is in its third edition making it a best venture. Its focus is on community-based participatory research. 19 Students were identified and were expected to devote around 250 hours on a chosen socially relevant project. PUKAR was entrusted with providing necessary training program. The students were divided into two groups and named as PEACE and ADHYATAN. PEACE was to explore the safety of college-going girls travelling in Mumbai's local trains and ADHYATAN was to survey the awareness levels among college youth and staff about sexual harassment and redressal in higher educational institutions.

The groups worked with the chosen community using modern research skills and different data collection techniques. The results obtained were analyzed and the research report was documented as part of the study. On successful completion of the projects students were given certificate and a fellowship amounting Rs. 15000 and reimbursement of their expenses incurred during the period. The successful fellows presented their findings through interactive sessions/skits before a selected gathering at the college and other institutions. 19 students were benefited by this best practice.

2. Promoting research culture

10 University and UGC Major and Minor Project sanctioned in 2015-16 are in progress. 07 University and UGC Major and Minor Projects have been completed and submitted. 04 UGC and University Minor Project sanctioned in 2016-17 with funding of Rs 3,65,000.

2 million pounds sanctioned for a collaborative project between India's Jain Foods, Khalsa College and Ozopure from UK under Newton Bhabha fund. Khalsa College share is 1.3 crores.

Research Publication and Participation
