FEEDBACK

The institution has a well-structured feedback mechanism to perceive performance and quality. It has a customized and computer based performance appraisal system to collect feedback on principal from teachers (PAPT), Head of the Department from the teaching staff of the concerned Department (PAHT) and an extensive feedback mechanism of the performance of the teachers by students (PATS). Under PATS, for each teacher, around 40-50 students are taken randomly from the classes where the teacher teaches and a predesigned questionnaire is supplied to students. They give their feedback online, which are analyzed by specially designed indigenous software and the report is given to the teachers, with ranking in the College. Student satisfaction index (SSI) is also calculated to get a quantitative assessment from the student on the services provided by the Institution.

Best Practice Annexure 3

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional objectives and/or contributed to the quality improvement of the core activities of the College.

Best Practices

1. Gunvati John Kapoor's 'Youth Leaders as Changemakers Fellowship':

Students were identified to undertake socially relevant research projects. The program was sponsored by Gunvati John Kapoor Medical Charitable Trust and the NGO 'PUKAR'. As per the program students were expected to devote around 250 hours on a chosen socially relevant project. PUKAR was entrusted with providing necessary training program. The students were divided into different groups and each was allowed to select a topic of their interest. They worked with the chosen community using modern research skills and different data collection techniques. The results obtained were analyzed and the research report was documented as part of the study. On successful completion of the projects students were given certificate and a fellowship amounting Rs. 15000 and reimbursement of their expenses incurred during the period. The successful fellows presented their findings through interactive sessions/skits before a selected gathering at the college. 41 students were benefited by this best practice.

Three research groups namely Shine Group, Sunshine Group and Young Star's Group were formed. Following were the topics chosen by the teams –

- Shine Group Understanding problems of single parenting.
- Sunshine Group Understanding gender discrimination in families.
- Young Stars' Group Understanding hardships of LGBT community.

2. Promoting research culture

The College has seen a marked improvement in every aspect of research since the previous accreditation. In the year 2014-15 number of minor projects sanctioned were 24 with funding amount received being Rs. 39,48,000 and are in progress. One major project with funding of Rs 14,00,000 was sanctioned. There have been a substantial number of minor and major research proposals submitted and sanctioned during 2015-2016.

- Publications of research papers and books has increased from 43 to 60
- Number of research guides has increased to 34 and around 30 students have registered for the Ph.D course
- Representation of teachers and students in national and international conferences, workshops and symposiums has been good.
- Promotion of research culture has helped the College to get recognition from different Government/academic bodies: Best College Award of University of Mumbai, Star College Award and FIST grant and recognition as SIRO by DST.
